Math Curriculum:

Teachers in grades K-5 will use Houghton Mifflin – Math Expressions. Teachers in grades 6-8 will use Houghton Mifflin – Big Ideas.

Science Curriculum:

Teachers in grades K-6 will use Science Fusion. Teachers in grades 6-8 will use Holt Science & Technology series.

Social Studies Curriculum:

Teachers in grades K-5 will use Harcourt Horizons series. Teachers in grades 6-8 will use World Cultures and Geography series.

Interventions:

Reading Mastery (Grades K-3), Corrective Reading and Math (Grades 4-8), i-Ready (Grades K-8), Lexia Reading (Grades K-8), i-Ready Math (Grades K-8).
